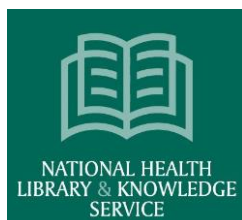

Summary of problem or reason for enquiry	<p>Synthesising literature on leading practices for health care board members in the Irish context and making a repository of resources and reading available in an accessible form.</p>
Brief description of the information found / service provided	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The initial literature review was undertaken by Gethin White (clinical librarian) in 2016 (focusing on previous ten years' publications, in Canada, USA, UK, Australia, New Zealand and Europe) • This informed the development of a draft guidance document for consultation • After consultation a further literature review was undertaken to identify emerging thinking – identifying nine new important sources informing the guidance. • The library distributed the monthly <i>Quality Digest</i> 28th August 2017 via email with direct links to articles. • Article No. 4 was spotted by the National Director, and sent on the day to the project group. Jones et al (2017), 'How does hospital boards govern for quality improvement? A mixed methods study of fifteen organisations in England', <i>BMJ Quality and Safety</i> (http://dx.doi.org/bmjqs-2016-006433). • As a result of receiving this article in a timely fashion the guidance was revised just before submission for authorisation for publication by the HSE Directorate (11th September 2017). • ISBN was requested and allocated by Bennery Rickard, Dr. Steevens Library and the library fulfilled legal deposit requirement on behalf of HSE. • Accompanying the guidance document is an online toolkit – which the library team Bennery Rickard and Laua Rooney Ferris advised on the best approach to set up links in keeping with intellectual property rights. • Bennery Rickard and Laua Rooney Ferris also advised that the document be assigned a creative commons attribution-Non Commercial license . • A PDF was supplied to the Library for inclusion on <i>Lenus</i>, the Irish Health repository.

<p>Summary of outcome and impact</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Identification of seminal article and inclusion of findings P21 of the guidance document http://www.hse.ie/eng/about/Who/QID/governancequality/Board-role-Improving-Quality-and-Safety/2-Practices.pdf • Compliance to publishing standards and legal deposit • Supported the HSE Open Access publishing statement by making the publication available via Lenus • Increased visibility because of inclusion within a national repository which is highly used by a broad range of researchers and policy makers. • Users of the toolkit have seamless access from one website to the core literature pertinent to their role as a health care board member (executive and non-executive). • Making the included HSE developed resources freely available for board members to take and adapt to their own specific content. The use of the creative commons attribution-Non Commercial license facilitates the broadest use of the HSE materials.
