HLI TO REPRESENT HSE ON INTERNATIONAL STAGE

Over the past few months, HLI has continued to meet the information needs of HSE staff, students on clinical placement and other partner organisations through a variety of value-added services.

These include literature searches, summaries of evidence on priority topics, training in searching and use of eHealth library resources, subject expert support on working groups and onsite library facilities across the HSE.

Recent highlights include a 'Navigating the Evidence' webinar on 31st May for all nurses and midwives in Ireland, delivered in partnership with the Chief Nursing Office of the Department of Health and the HSE ONMSD. It was accredited by the Nursing & Midwifery Board of Ireland, with approximately 200 attendees.

More webinars will be provided during the coming months for different users such as managers and doctors, including a group of some two hundred Ukrainian doctors recently arrived in Ireland.

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Library services are back to normal and arranging onsite training from publishers including ClinicalKey, UptoDate and others. On 17th May an online webinar, "Fake News to 'infodemic' – five interesting years for librarians" was hosted by HLI in conjunction with the European Association for Health Information and Libraries. Librarians from around the world will meet in Dublin in July for the biggest international library conference in the world, the IFLA World Congress. This will be held in the Dublin Convention Centre with a number of posters presented by the HSE HLI team. I will be presenting a paper during a dedicated session about "Innovation in Irish Health and Academic Libraries" together with librarians from the Irish university sector. Our partnership with key internal stakeholders such as NDTP; NMPDU; HSCP; OoCIO; Digital Transformation and external partners such as IBM, Interleaf Technology and Section 38 organisations will be a key feature.

HLI has finalised a communication policy which underpins all our services. For doctors on rotation, please get in contact with your local HLI library to avail of the many resources available to you.

EnergyPod Touches Down in Naas General Hospital

Naas General Hospital is the 4th HSE hospital to have an EnergyPod installed, joining St Luke's General Hospital, Kilkenny; Cork University Hospital; and University Hospital Limerick.

A MetroNaps EnergyPod is now available for all Naas General Hospital staff. The official launch for the EnergyPod was held on Thursday, May 12th and was very well received. Health Library Ireland staff who attended the launch were Aoife Lawton, Bennery Rickard, Ronan Hegarty and Jean Rickard.



The EnergyPod is located just outside the library and is the world's first chair designed for napping at work.

All features of the pod are designed to help busy clinical staff relax and recharge.

The EnergyPod is funded by the National Doctors Training and Planning (NDTP) in association with Health Library Ireland.



Research has shown that a short nap at work can help employees feel more alert as well as offer many other performance benefits.

Companies that have used EnergyPods to great effect include the likes of Google, Nike and Procter & Gamble. They have been installed in hospitals, universities, factories and airports worldwide.





HSE National Central Repository update

The National 3PG Repository Team (3PGs indicate policies, procedures, protocols and guidelines and may be clinical or non-clinical) is part of Health Library Ireland, based at Dr Steevens' Hospital in Dublin.

We are in the early project development stage to set up the National Central Repository (NCR) which will provide a single trusted location on the HSE website to access, store and manage National Clinical Guidelines and National 3PGs.

Oversight of our project work is provided by the National 3PG Governance Group, chaired by Dr Ana Terrés, Assistant National Director, Head of Research and Evidence.

The work of National 3PG Repository Team is divided into two distinct phases:

1. Set-up of the National Central Repository

The NCR working group is chaired by Aoife Lawton, General Manager, Health Library Ireland. Consultation is underway with a range of internal and external stakeholders including the Office of the Chief Information Officer, Digital Communications and other advisory groups to scope out the requirements for the NCR.

The consultation process includes defining the types of National 3PGs that will be stored on the NCR, whether a digital template would be of value to those tasked with writing and developing national documents, and if an electronic workflow system would improve the management, approval and control of current national document lifecycle processes.

The long term location of the existing HSE COVID-19 repository will also be considered at a later point in the project, a joint decision with <u>Clinical Design and Innovation and Health Library Ireland</u>.

2. Review of National Framework for Developing PPPGs and Template

Aligned with the project to set up the NCR, a review of the existing **HSE National Framework for Developing PPPGs** (2016) and template is under way by our working groups, led by the National 3PG Governance Group.

This is a parallel process to the set-up of the NCR and is essential to inform the needs analysis. Following the review and a national consultation process, recommendations will be made to replace the framework with a user-friendly practical manual for staff.

Webinar for nurses and midwives in Ireland









National Central Repository Staff Survey

The HSE are looking to add structure and transparency around the creation, authorization, review and consumption of documents, and transform the process to a complete online system. Work is in progress to create a central location on the HSE website to house National Policies, Procedures, Protocols and Guidelines (PPPGs), clinical and non-clinical, where users are confident they are reviewing the most up to-date-documents.

Health Library Ireland - Procurement Developments

I recently started as Library Resource Manager after being the librarian in UHK Tralee for just over two years and working on the Evidence Team. Before joining HLI, I used to work in management in a large university library system in Berlin, Germany.

The primary focus of my new position is procurement of electronic library resources, and also of library systems and services, whilst I also have line management responsibilities in HLI South.

The main projects for the rest of 2022 in procurement are two EU tenders, one for the hosting and services around our existing library system KOHA, the other for a potentially new discovery system.

We will be focusing on the introduction of interlibrary loan and document supply through KOHA, re-organising it into a centralised service; also the further implementation of Consortia Manager (our backend system for the administration of contracts, licences and subscriptions) in close cooperation with the HLI Digital Team, so that we can use all its functionalities.

Health Library Ireland has recently acquired Journal of Forensic Nursing, for use by the staff of the Sexual Assault Treatment Units (SATUs) in the HSE.

The SATUs in Dublin, Galway, Mullingar, Letterkenny, Cork and Waterford will have full on-site access to Journal of Forensic Nursing to drive improvements in practice.

The Journal of Forensic Nursing (JFN) addresses health care issues that transcend health and legal systems by articulating nursing's response to violence. Journal topics include interpersonal violence (sexual assault, abuse, intimate partner violence); death investigation; legal and ethical issues; forensic mental health nursing; correctional nursing; and emergency and trauma nursing.

The IFLA Health and Biosciences Libraries Section, in collaboration with the IFLA Evidence for Global and Disaster Health Special Interest Group and the Health Sciences Libraries Group of the Library Association of Ireland, are cosponsoring a satellite meeting on 29 July in conjunction with the 2022 IFLA World Library & Information Congress.

The theme of the meeting is "Exploring How Open Science and Open Access Influence the Spread of Health Misinformation and Disinformation and How Librarians Can Help". This half-day seminar is being hosted by HSE Health Library Ireland in Dr. Steevens' Hospital Boardroom.



Dr Steevens' Library Development

So leaving aside the new soft focus furnishings, smart bit of rug and a nice lick of paint, how is the about-to-be re-booted Dr Steevens' Library different from the old one?

Firstly, a clarification. Dr Steevens' Library serves library users far beyond the staff based onsite. It also includes any national offices, for example, those based at Parkgate Street, Jervis Street, Merchant's Quay, Palmerstown etc.

This more defined remit as a 'corporate' library does mean that we are far better positioned to provide customised library services to our audience and perhaps also to develop the way that we look at and plan our services alongside our library users, rather than in isolation to them.








The new approach envisages Dr Steevens' Library being something of a hub/incubator which can take the input from a number of key national stakeholders within the organisation who are based in our HSE library postcode and channelling the ideas/needs/input into our National Library Teams.

This is already happening with key referrals being directed into the Knowledge Support Team, training sessions being formulated jointly with the Info Skills Team and enquiry work being developed alongside the Evidence Team.

Obviously, some work will remain local to our library and there isn't a magic formula to getting the balance right but it does ensure our library is primed to be a focal point for a number of things, which is exciting.

Finally, having 'glossed' over the work that has been done to our physical library space, this repositioning will also influence our services significantly. Dr Steevens already hosts the annual Open Access awards but the revamped space means that the library is now far better fitted to launching other events. Our user base tends to be a fairly mobile, dynamic one and the library is now better configured as a working space to support their multi-layered needs. There'll be more on this in our next newsletter.





participant was given a number and a random online number generator was used to select the winner. Jean Rickard was the lucky prize winner on the day.



Past and Present Rub Elbows at St Luke's Library

St Luke's Radiation Oncology Network (SLRON) are in the process of developing the Gate Lodge as a patient wellbeing space and the renovations of the Gate Lodge might form part of the RTE series The Great House Revival. I understook a research on the history of the Gate Lodge in the grounds of Oaklands / Rathgar House.

I contacted Royal Institute of Architects of Ireland and the Irish architectural archives but they do not have any specific reference to the existence of drawings for St Luke's/ Oaklands or the gate lodges on the grounds. The Gate Lodge was built by Charles Wisdom.

The printer and businessman Charles Wisdom Hely (1857–1929) lived at Oakland, now St. Luke's Hospital, Rathgar, along with his wife Edith Beech.

Interesting traces of heraldry connected to the Hely family can be seen today in many old structures about the grounds, especially on the gate lodge and main entrance.

SLRON library as can be seen from the picture is within Oaklands House and was possibly a drawing room or sitting room.

Architect and RTE 'Home of the Year' judge Hugh Wallace visited St Luke's Hospital library Rathgar on 25 May 2022 – pictured here with Jacqueline Robinson, General Manager SLRON Network and Dr Clare Faul, Clincial Director SLRON Network, outside the SLRON Library.





Meanwhile, Ruth Ryan (pictured, far left), Programme Manager NCCP and Professor Risteard O'Laoide (pictured, third from right), Director visited SLRON library to express thanks to all HSE librarians who have worked on research for NCCP guidelines now and in the past.

Eleanor's objective was to bring HSE Sparks and Thinkactionable closer to Our Lady of Lourdes Hospital's frontline.

The workshop was facilitated by Martin Ryan, former
Director of Undergraduate Studies in Design Innovation at
Maynooth University; Author of ARRIVE - A Design
Innovation Framework to Deliver Breakthrough Services,
Products, and Experiences; proprietary inventor of the
world's first cantilevered saddle and a multi-awardwinning designer and entrepreneur.

Martin has featured in prominent international media and publications including RTE, CNN, The Guardian, and The Irish Times.

On the day, 14 enthusiastic healthcare participants were willing to discover the magic of #designthinking and new learning. The theme for the workshop was 'Waiting Lists' 'Waiting Areas'.

Martin started the morning off with an insightful presentation on innovation and the Design Thinking Process consisting of 7 stages: Audit, Research, Reframe, Ideate, Validation, and Execution. Which followed by the first task of 'How Might We' exercise.










In the second challenge of the day, Eleanor sent participants in pairs out to different outpatients areas allocated within the hospital. For this task, they had to strike up a conversation with a patient or staff member. Ask 'How are you today?' and ask them to share their current experience(s) and their journey to that department. Healthcare participants arrived back with plenty of feedback and shared their observations.


The final challenge of the day set by Martin Ryan was for the participants to think about their solutions to resolving any issue identified during the second challenge and then put this into a tangible item with the help of using the HSE

Makerlab Trolley.

The library was filled with a creative buzz instead of silence. It was lovely to hear participants ideating out loudly whilst creating their prototype.

All participants on the day outdid themselves. From Apps to Interactive Screens to Activity Bags, these were only some of the fantastic innovative ideas displayed on the day.





If anything the Design Thinking Workshop has taught the healthcare frontline a new way of thinking and has shown solutions can become reality with innovative thinking and teamwork.

I would like to thank Eleanor Campbell and HSE Spark Innovation Programme for letting the Health Library Ireland be part of this event on the day. This is the first of many Design Thinking Workshops coming to HSE Health Library Ireland and Healthcare Frontline.
