HSE OPEN ACCESS AWARDS CAP BUSY YEAR FOR HLI

The ninth annual HSE Open Access Research Awards were presented in Dr Steevens' Hospital on Monday 5th December.

The awards were presented by Dr Philip Crowley (National Director, Strategy and Research) and represented a welcome return to normality after the past two years of online-only events. The newly-refitted national library HQ in Dr Steevens' allowed the awards to be staged as a hybrid event, with attendees joining in virtually.

The newly-refurbished HLI HQ provided a congenial setting for the ceremony.

Dr Crowley spoke about the scientific and societal benefits of research being carried out in an Open Access context, and paid special tribute to those researchers carrying out research in addition to their clinical duties. He also announced the winners in the five subject categories, as well the special innovation award and the overall winner.

External judge Dr Jonathan Drennan spoke warmly about the entry by overall winner Andrea Bowe paper, praising it for its methodological approach in a complex environment, and its innovative use of a supportive environment. He described it as a highly effective intervention.



Dr Drennan also praised the special innovation awards winner, Martin Boudou, for the timeliness of his paper analysing enteric infections during the flood events of 2015-2016, which demonstrated the impact of climate change on public health in Ireland. He noted its innovative use of data and statistical modelling of the highest quality.

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HSE Open Access Awards cap busy year for HLI

Speaking about the category winners, Dr Drennan paid tribute to the range of research topics and the evidence of extensive cooperation at national and international level. He reflected on the challenge of choosing winners from such a wealth of high-quality research, and congratulated the HSE and HLI for their work.

Susan Harvey, winner of the Acute Care & Hospitals category, spoke about her colleagues' research into infantile spasms, a common occurrence in babies with Down's syndrome. Ireland has the highest prevalence internationally for infantile spasms, which afforded a unique opportunity to explore the phenomenon.

Kieran Walsh, winner of the Community & Social Care award, was part of a team providing evidence to NPHET during the pandemic, and was able to synthesize their findings into the duration of infectiousness for individuals with Covid-19, in order to inform policy decisions around isolation and testing.





Yvonne Gregory won for the Climate & Environmental Health category - Masters dissertation, interest in infrastructure resilience level of research into extreme weather and its impact. Found that health services did not find emphasis of extreme weather events on health infrastructure and that funding was extremely deficient.

Andrea Bowe, the overall winner of the Open Access Awards 2022, described her team's multi-component stop-smoking intervention in a large prison, including education about empowerment, and collaboration between staff and prisoners. According to Andrea the outcomes were very positive in terms of smoking cessation rates and reduction of exposure to second-hand smoke. She was hopeful that the research could be implemented across the prison service.

This year's awards attracted a total of 72 valid entries, the second-highest total ever and and indication of the high level of research activity across the health services in Ireland.



Martin Boudou, accepting his special innovation award, described how his team's research found that the extreme weather of 2015 was likely to be responsible for elevated levels of gastrointestinal infections.

Martin spoke about the importance of the findings for socioeconomic and climate research integration.







A year of innovation and change in HLI

It's been a year of accelerated transformation as we emerge from the twin challenges of the Covud-19 pandemic and the cyber-attack of May 2021. The National HSE Library Service was rebranded to Health Library Ireland (HLI) in 2022 with a long-awaited new name. Our headquarters in Dr Steevens' Hospital got a very welcome refurbishment!

HLI are coming into the final year of the existing strategy and so much has been achieved. Our HLI Evidence service has implemented standards for 4 different types of literature searches consistently. What this means that anyone who requests an Evidence Search will receive results that undergo the same process and standard, regardless of which point of contact in our service the request comes through. This year 487 literature searches were completed and results sent to users. The Information Skills team delivered 62 accredited online training sessions throughout the year.

Other highlights this year include two Webinars, one for nurses and midwives and another Research Masterclass

Both were very well attended (over 400 participants) and the feedback was very positive.





CONUL Teaching & Learning Annual Seminar

The Consortium of National and University Libraries (CONUL) is the representative body of research libraries in Ireland and Northern Ireland. It was established in 1971 by the seven university libraries and the National Library of Ireland.

Later members to join the consortium were RCSI, TU Dublin and RIA. More recently Queen's University Belfast and the University of Ulster have become members.

I heard about the CONUL Teaching and Learning (T&L) Annual Seminar from Mercy University Hospital librarian, Breeda Herlihy, who suggested that I present my nursing journal club talk to CONUL as it covered a number of their seminar topics for this year:



- Promotion of sustainable practice in information literacy: including work that supports and embeds the UN Sustainable Development Goals at all levels
- Creation and use of Open Educational Resources in teaching: case studies of developing and implementing OERs as part of library teaching, to enhance equity of access
- Using technology to enhance teaching and learning: including the use of emerging tools and platforms to advance or repurpose learning support
- Working within a changed environment: how libraries have adopted creative approaches to the way we work as teams and individuals

Highlights of the Seminar

"assignment toolkits".



2. The National Access Plan and the future of library classes by Elaine Chapman & Rebecca Jones, Technological University Dublin.

This was also an overall interesting presentation, but stood out for its promotion of accessibility tools (some of which are available to us for free, but are simply underused, such as Microsoft 365 captions tool).



Canvas Modules

Course consists of seven, selfdirected interdisciplinary modules.

Offer teaching to all UCC students on information searching and Library resources.

Also includes specialist content from Special Collections & Archives and Research Services.



I presented briefly on the Mental Health Nursing Journal Club project with updates and learnings from more recent meetings and got a lot of positive feedback following my session, as the organisers said that they do not really get an example of these skills being used in the workplace.

So it is worth attending CONUL T&L seminar; while their settings tend to be much larger with more elaborate facilities, the challenges we face professionally are surprisingly similar.

3. Collaborating with Students: Reflections on UCC Library co-creating learning experiences by Stephanie Chen (UCC), which covered a number of initiatives the library had undertaken to create better awareness of the library services and did so with refreshing honesty. We heard about Library Learning Resources on Canvas, what hworked in terms of working on these projects with students chosen from different backgrounds and experience, embedded H5P objects, and less successful adventures (an elaborate library scavenger hunt which had only 2 participants).






Third Biennial Evidence-Based Practice (EBP) Ireland Three-Day Workshop

Myself and Shauna Barrett from the Health Library Ireland Evidence team attended the third biennial Evidence-Based Practice (EBP) Ireland three-day workshop, which took place from 8-10 November, hosted this year by the HSE's National Cancer Control Programme, King's Inns House, Parnell St., Dublin 1. I'm a founding member of EBP Ireland.

Previous workshops, held at Dublin Castle in 2017 and 2019, were facilitated with the assistance of the Centre for Evidence-Based Medicine (CEBM), University of Oxford. As a long-term ambition, this year's was the first workshop organised and delivered solely by members of the EBP Ireland Steering Group, many of whom have studied at and worked with the CEBM for a long number of years.

The workshop aimed to introduce participants to the principles of evidence-based practice, from formulating answerable clinical questions, to finding and critically appraising the best available research evidence to help answer their questions, to implementing the evidence in the specific context of their clinical practice. At all times, the best available research evidence is comprehended as only one part of a triad that also incorporates clinicians' expertise and patients' values and preferences.




During the three days of the workshop, plenary sessions were delivered on asking answerable questions, searching the literature, the most appropriate study designs to answer different types of clinical question (randomized controlled trials, cohort studies, cross-sectional studies, case-control studies). In addition to the plenary sessions, workshop participants were divided into four smaller learning groups, with regular opportunities for group activities and more indepth discussion. Each learning group was supported by two EBP Ireland facilitators.

Tom Hope, a patient representative on the NCCP's Prostate Cancer GP Referral Guideline, gave a heartfelt and insightful keynote address on the opening morning of the workshop. Tom spoke about his personal experience as both a patient and a patient representative on a national clinical guideline development group.







The workshop was attended by 30 healthcare professionals from a range of disciplines in the health service, with overall feedback hugely positive: 91% of evaluation respondents rated their overall impression of the workshop good or excellent; 100% found the organisation of the workshop good or excellent; 96% stated that they had achieved their learning objectives; and 100% indicated that they would recommend the workshop to colleagues.

Many thanks to all of the facilitators and organisers who gave so generously of their time and expertise. Thanks also to the Naji Foundation, which continues to sponsor all costs associated with the workshop, and to all workshop participants, who brought their own clinical expertise, energy, and willingness to engage with learning activities and with each other throughout the three days.

National 3PG Repository Team Review of 2022

The National 3PG* Repository Team is part of Health Library Ireland, based at Dr Steevens' Hospital in Dublin. We are a part of a larger project group set up to support delivery of the project objectives *outlined below.

Oversight of the project work is provided by the National 3PG Steering Group which is chaired by Dr Ana Terrés, Assistant National Director, Head of Research and Evidence. Health Library Ireland is part of Research and Evidence reporting to Strategy and Research. Our project objectives are coordinated through three working groups, and a Chairs Forum, with individual programmes of work which are all aligned to the overall project plan.

National Central Repository (NCR) working group

The NCR working group is chaired by Aoife Lawton, General Manager, Health Library Ireland. The NCR will be a document management system hosted on the HSE website, it will provide a central storage location for all approved HSE National 3PGs* including National Clinical Practice Guidelines. The NCR will ensure HSE National 3PGs are version controlled, managed, monitored, reviewed in a timely manner and safely archived. There has been wide and extensive stakeholder engagement from the outset, including two rounds of User Surveys (to understand user values, preferences and current challenges), with service users, staff and management, which was collated by Digital Comms User Experience team, which also helped inform the system requirements for the NCR.

The group is working closely with HSE Digital Comms User Experience team and developers; work to date has included defining the NCR system requirements and developing a roadmap for future versions. The first version of the NCR will focus on existing National 3PGs in PDF format, document classification/inclusion criteria and management of metadata. The NCR roadmap includes requirements for a new National Digital Template(s) (clinical and non-clinical), feasibility of online approval of National 3PGs and a facility to self-register National 3PGs in development – this will enhance stakeholder engagement and in time reduce duplication of documentation across the health service. It is hoped that the first version of the NCR will be operational by the end of Q1 2023.

Review of National Framework for Developing PPPGs (2016)

The HSE National Framework for Developing PPPGs is in place and used in the HSE since 2016. A review of this Framework is in progress by two working groups (clinical practice guidelines and non-clinical) with each developing their own practical guide, informed by national audit findings and wide stakeholder engagement and feedback. This is a parallel process to the setup of the National Central Repository and is essential to inform the needs analysis. Both working groups are making significant progress in preparation for national consultation in March 2023.

The Non-Clinical working group is chaired by Una McCarthy, Senior Manager, National Primary Care. Feedback was sought on the existing National Framework with a wide stakeholder group in early 2022. Feedback has been incorporated into the draft Practical Guide, with has greatly strengthened sections on definitions, determining the need for a National 3PG/prioritisation, planning, implementation and assurance.

The Clinical Guidelines working group is chaired by Dr Eve O'Toole, Head of the Evidence and Quality Hub in the National Cancer Control Programme (NCCP). An in-person design thinking workshop with a strong emphasis on governance was held in September 2022 facilitated at NCCP with stakeholders from across the HSE. Solutions proposed have been incorporated into the draft clinical Practical Guide which is well progressed and will provide simple and straightforward guidance for clinical practice guideline developers.



You told us that the biggest barriers you faced in disseminating your research were time constraints, not having links with policy makers or evidence users, and a lack of organisational support. You told us that to make a difference you needed:

- · a research culture that acknowledged, valued, and supported research
- · advice and support and guidance
- · funding and training
- communication of research
- · help with patient and public involvement.

Searching Medline/CINAHL in Ebsco


